More Meatloaf, Your Majesty?

Schedule a family dinner where no screens are allowed (TV, tablet, phones, etc.) and everyone is around one table. Set an extra place at the table for the King. There's no need to make an elaborate meal—even kings are fans of pizza or meatloaf.

While you're eating together, talk about this as a family: **How would you act if a real king was eating dinner with you? How might that change what you talk about or how you talk to each other?**

Well, spoiler alert: Jesus is the King of kings, and He's already with you at the table. Discuss this together: What might you want to say to Him? What might you ask Him? And what do you think He'd have to say to your family?



Gold, Frankincense, and a Soccer Ball

As a family, pick a special spot in your home where you can stack stuff without fear it'll end up broken. Then invite everyone in your family to go get something that's especially precious to them. It might be a cherished photo from the living room wall, a video game controller, a new cell phone, or even that set of golf clubs Dad saved up for a year to buy.

Place those objects in the special spot as a symbol of giving those precious gifts to Jesus. Then leave the objects untouched for 24 hours. (The magi left their precious gifts with Jesus forever!)

Say: When we worship Jesus, we decide that He's most important. We give Him the honor and glory He deserves, and we don't let anything come between us ... even our favorite soccer ball.

As a family, share a snack and talk about this: Since Jesus probably doesn't want golf clubs, what do you think He wants from us? (Hint: Our love!)
